LEARNING OUTCOMES PROMOTED BY COOPERATIVE LEARNING

- 1. Higher achievement and increased retention
- 2. More frequent higher-level reasoning, deeper level of understanding, and critical thinking
- 3. Greater achievement motivation and intrinsic motivation to learn
- 4. Greater ability to view situations from others' perspectives
- 5. More positive, accepting, and supportive relationships with peers regardless of ethnic, gender, ability, social class, or other differences
- 6. Greater social support
- 7. Greater psychological health, adjustment, and well-being
- 8. More positive self-esteem based on basic self-acceptance
- 9. Great social competencies

TYPES OF COOPERATIVE LEARNING GROUPS

Formal Duration: 1 class period to several weeks

<u>Purpose</u>: To ensure that students are actively involved in the

intellectual work of: organizing material, explaining it, summarizing it, and

integrating it into existing conceptual structures

Informal Duration: Few minutes to one class period

<u>Purpose:</u> Used to direct teaching to focus attention, set a mood conducive to learning, set expectations for lesson, insure that students cognitively process material, and provide closure to an instructional session

<u>Base</u> <u>Duration:</u> Long-term, quarter or semester long

<u>Purpose:</u> Heterogeneous groups with stable membership so that members may give each other support, help, encouragement, assistance to progress

Checker/Encourager	Checks to make sure everyone understands

	Seeks instructor's assistance if needed
Organizer/Elaborator	Gets the group started
	Builds consensus
	Summarizes
	Relates information to prior class learning

5 BASIC ELEMENTS DEFINED

1. Positive Interdependence

- --Each person must demonstrate successful learning. The group will succeed or fail together. "We sink or swim together."
- --Materials and assessments are intentionally administered.

2. Face-to-face interaction

-- "Knee to knee & eye to eye"

3. Individual accountability

- --Each member must be able to explain or demonstrate that he or she has learned the concept, information, or technique.
- --Each person must be actively engaged.

4. Interpersonal skills

- --Active participation by all members
- --Checking for understanding
- -- Encouragement/support
- --Clarification, elaboration by all members

5. Group processing

--Each group should list three things they did well together and one thing they would do better next time.
